Sami Al-Arian is a Palestinian-American civil rights activist who was a computer engineering professor and a tenured academic at the University of South Florida receiving several teaching awards and grants. During his four decades in the US (1975-2015), Dr. Al-Arian founded numerous institutions and publications in the fields of education, research, religion and interfaith, as well as civil and human rights. He was a prolific speaker across many US campuses, especially on Palestine, Islam and the West, and Civil Rights. After a contentious interview on FOX News following the September 11 attacks, Dr. Al-Arian's tenure came under attack and his professorship became the most significant academic freedom case since Angela Davis. In 2001, he was named by Newsweek the "premiere civil rights activist" in the US for his efforts to repeal the use of Secret Evidence in US immigration courts. He spent over 11 years in prison and under house arrest (2003-2014) before the government had to drop all of the charges. His US story was featured in the 2007 award-winning documentary "USA vs. Al-Arian," and in the 2016 book "Being Palestinian: Personal Reflections on Palestinian Identity in the Diaspora." Dr. Al-Arian has written dozens of articles that were translated to many languages focusing on US foreign policy, Palestine, and the Arab Spring phenomena. Dr. Al-Arian is currently the director of the Center for Islam and Global Affairs (CIGA) and public affairs professor at Istanbul Zaim University in Turkey.

Baffour Ankamah, former Editor of the London-based New African magazine, is a pan-African writer and editor who hails from Ghana but has lived in the Diaspora (principally in the UK and Zimbabwe) for the past 33 years. In 38 years of his journalism career, Africa and its many causes have been his passion. As Editor of New African from 1999 to 2014, he turned the magazine into a veritable mouthpiece of the African continent, a voice which was respected worldwide. His personal column, Baffour's Beefs, which has been running in New African since 1987, is a big hit and a must-read for the magazine's worldwide readers. Now based in Zimbabwe, he and his wife Elizabeth run their own media consultancy and fashion house called African Interest which trades under the trademark 'I am African'.

Maribel Aponte-García is Full professor and researcher at the Graduate School of Business and the Social Science Research Center, University of Puerto Rico, Rio Piedras Campus; and Caribbean Region Representative, Directing Committee, Latin American Social Science Research Council (CLACSO). She holds a PhD in Economics from the University of Massachusetts at Amherst; and has authored numerous refereed articles on regionalism, value chains and enterprises; one video collection on Cuba; and four books on regionalism and Latin American and Caribbean development. Her most recent works are on Cuba; the Bolivarian Alliance for the Americas; Geopolitics, regionalism, natural resources and chain mapping, for which she was awarded the Ruy Mauro Marini Prize by CLACSO; and food sustainability and trade regimes in Bolivia.

Kevin Barrett, an American Muslim and PhD Islamic Studies scholar, is one of America's best-known critics of the War on Terror. He is the translator and publisher of Laurent Guyénot's *From Yahweh to Zion* (2018) and has authored and edited several books, including *Orlando False Flag* (2016), *ANOTHER French False Flag* (2016) and *We Are NOT Charlie Hebdo* (2015). Dr. Barrett has appeared many times on Fox, CNN, PBS and other broadcast outlets, and has inspired feature stories and op-eds in the New York Times, the Christian Science Monitor, the Chicago Tribune, and other mainstream publications. A former teacher at colleges and universities in Paris, the San Francisco Bay Area, and Wisconsin, he currently works as author, talk radio host, False Flag Weekly News host, editor at Veterans Today, and TV pundit. His website is Truth Jihad.com.

Christopher Black is an international criminal lawyer based in Toronto, Ontario, Canada where he defended accused in a wide variety of criminal offences, including acting as counsel in several murder trials. He was appointed *amicus curiae* in the Kuldip Singh Samra case in 1993 (the Osgoode Hall shootings) by Mr. Justice John O'Driscoll. He has been involved in high-profile cases involving human rights and war crimes and has defended those accused of these crimes in Rwanda (see Rwandan Genocide) and the former Yugoslavia and is on the list of counsel at the International Criminal Court.

Alba Carosio is professor, doctorate tutor and senior researcher of Postgraduate Studies at the Women's Studies Center, Central University of Venezuela, so as Senior Researcher at the Rómulo Gallegos Center of Latin American Studies and at the International Center Miranda. In charge of the *Venezuelan Review* for Women's Studies since 2007, and Venezuelan Representative at Directing Committee, Latin American Social Science Research Council (CLACSO). She holds a PhD in Social Sciences from Central University of Venezuela, and has authored numerous refereed articles on Ethics, Politics, Latin American issues, and Feminist/Gender Studies. Her most recent works are on challenges of Social Sciences and Humanities in Latin

America and the Caribbean, contributions of feminist thought and movement and Chavism as movement and political thought.

Thomas Cox is a U.S. citizen who lives in Asia. In December 2015, he conducted an interview of a Viet Nam family, residents of Phong Nha Town in Quang Binh Province, who had been bombed by Monsanto's Agent Orange being sprayed on them by U.S. planes.

Robin Eastman-Abaya is a Physician, educated in the Philippines at the University of the Philippines during the Marcos Dictatorship. 30 years experience as senior consultant pathologist diagnosing and documenting the overdose and premature death crisis among rural and small town citizens - covering a geographic range of around 13 impoverished and devastated counties in upstate New York. Her interests are documenting the health consequences of social and political decisions in a specific geographic context.

Richard Falk is an American professor emeritus of international law at Princeton University. He is the author or co-author of 30 books and the editor or co-editor of another 30 volumes. In 2008, the United Nations Human Rights Council (UNHRC) appointed Falk to a six-year term as a United Nations Special Rapporteur on "the situation of human rights in the Palestinian territories occupied since 1967." In 2017 UN ESCWA published his report, co-authored with Virginia Tilley, on Israel as an Apartheid State. His most recent books are *POWER SHIFT: ON THE NEW GLOBAL ORDER* (2016) and *REVISITING THE VIETNAM WAR: VIEWS OF RICHARD FALK* (2017), edited by Stefan Andersson.

Mike Gravel is an American politician who was a Democratic United States Senator from Alaska from 1969 to 1981 and a candidate in the 2008 U.S. presidential election. As a Senator, Gravel became nationally known for his forceful but unsuccessful attempts to end the draft during the War in Vietnam and for putting the Pentagon Papers into the public record in 1971 at some risk to himself.

Danny Haiphong is an anti-imperialist activist and journalist in the NYC area. He is a contributing columnist for Black Agenda Report since 2013. The focus of his work has been on the endless war conducted by US imperialism. Danny sees such war as an extension of the broader class war on the poor and oppressed both in the US and around the world. His articles have been republished in independent outlets such as TruthOut, CounterPunch, and MintPressNews. Danny has also frequently been a guest in CPNews with Don Debar and Black Agenda Radio with Glen Ford and Nellie Bailey. At the moment, Danny is collaborating on a book tentatively titled "American exceptionalism and American innocence: The Twin Evils of Race and Empire" with Professor Roberto Sirvent.

Edward S. Herman, professor emeritus of finance at the Wharton School, University of Pennsylvania, has written extensively on economics, political economy, and the media. Among his books are *Corporate Control*, *Corporate Power* (1981), *The Real Terror Network* (1982), and, with Noam Chomsky, *The Political Economy of Human Rights* (1979) and *Manufacturing Consent* (2002). Deceased.

Wayne Madsen is an investigative journalist, author and newspaper columnist. He has been a frequent political and national security commentator on television and radio networks. He has some forty years of experience in national security issues, including as a U.S. Naval officer and stints with the National Security Agency, State Department, and Defense Department contractor corporations. He is the author of 15 books on various topics, including data privacy, political corruption, intelligence matters, and genocide.

Charles Onana is a journalist of investigation and essayist Franco-Cameroonian, who is best known for his writings on the genocide in Rwanda, including his 2018 Ph.D. dissertation on the topic. He is also known for his pioneering work on the history of the skirmishes between Africans in the French army during the Second World War. He led the Pan-African Organization of Independent Journalists.

David Peterson is an independent journalist and researcher based in Chicago. He is coauthor, with Edward Herman, of "The Dismantling of Yugoslavia," *Monthly Review* (October 2007).

James Petras is a retired Bartle Professor (Emeritus) of Sociology at Binghamton University in Binghamton, New York and adjunct professor at Saint Mary's University, Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada who has published on Latin American and Middle Eastern political issues. He is the author of more than 62 books published in 29 languages, and over 600 articles in professional journals, including the American Sociological Review, British Journal of Sociology, Social Research, and Journal of Peasant Studies.

Alberto Robillato is a Canadian journalist, and former correspondent for Canadian Press, Latin America and Notimex.

Paul Craig Roberts Dr. Paul Craig Roberts is a former Assistant Secretary of the US Treasury, member of the US Congressional staff, associate editor and columnist for the Wall Street Journal, and columnist for Business Week, the Scripps Howard News Service, and Creators Syndicate. He has held academic appointments in six universities, including the William E. Simon Chair in Political Economy, Center for Strategic and International Studies, Georgetown. He has testified before committees of Congress on 30 occasions. He is author or coauthor of twelve books and numerous articles in scholarly journals. Dr. Roberts was awarded the US Treasury's Meritorious Service Award for "outstanding contributions to the formulation of US economic policy," and France's Legion of Honor as "the artisan of a renewal in economic science and policy after half a century of state interventionism" by the government of Francois Mitterrand. The Saker was born in a military family of "White" Russian refugees in western Europe where he lived most of his life. After completing two college degrees in the USA, he returned to Europe where he worked as a military analyst until he lost his career due to his vocal opposition to the western-sponsored wars in Chechnia, Croatia, Bosnia and Kosovo. After re-training as a software engineer, he moved to the Florida where he now lives. The Saker is the founder of the Saker Community of Blogs, which now features: 7 blogs (Main, French, Russian, Oceanian, Latin American, Italian, Serbian) written in 7 languages.. The main blog alone gets two to three million pageviews per month. The international Saker community is composed of about 100 volunteers including professional translators. Articles from the Saker blog are picked up by Russia Insider, the Asia Times, Information Clearing House and many others news sources and our work has been quoted by Paul Craig Roberts, Sheikh Imran Hosein, Pepe Escobar and many others.

Mark Schuller is Associate Professor of Anthropology and Nonprofit and NGO Studies at Northern Illinois University and affiliate at the Faculté d'Ethnologie, l'Université d'État de Haïti. Schuller's research on NGOs, globalization, disasters, and gender in Haiti has been published in over three dozen book chapters and peer-reviewed articles as well as public media, including a column in *Huffington Post*. He is the author of two monographs, including *Humanitarian Aftershocks in Haiti* (Rutgers, 2016) and co-editor of five volumes, including *Tectonic Shifts: Haiti since the Earthquake* (Kumarian Press, 2012). He is co-director / co-producer of documentary *Poto Mitan: Haitian Women, Pillars of the Global Economy* (2009). Schuller is co-editor of *Berghahn Books' Catastrophes in Context* and *University of Alabama Press' NGOographies: a Series of Ethnographic Reflections of NGOs*. Recipient of the Margaret Mead Award and the Anthropology in Media Award, he is active in several solidarity efforts.

Jose Maria Sison is a Filipino patriot, a proletarian revolutionary, professor, and internationalist. He is a Filipino statesman, known for his experience in and knowledge of the people's democratic government and revolutionary forces in the Philippines. He is sometimes consulted by high officials of foreign governments and by presidents, senators, congressmen and local officials of the Philippine reactionary government concerning peace negotiations with the National Democratic Front of the Philippines (NDFP) and related matters. He is recognized as the foremost thinker and leader of the Filipino people's movement for national liberation and democracy in the last 50 years. Prof. Sison is the Chairperson of the International Coordinating Committee, International League of Peoples' Struggle.

Keith Harmon Snow is the 2009 Regent's Lecturer in Law & Society at the University of California, Santa Barbara, recognized for over a decade of work on war crimes, crimes against humanity and genocide. A photojournalist and war correspondent, he is a three time Project Censored award-winner; the author of the recently published book: *The Worst Interests of the Child*; and his photography is spotlighted on the Social Documentary Network. A presenter at the 65th Annual Conference on World Affairs, he is also a Grof-certified facilitator of Holotropic Breathwork, a Motivational Speaker, and a professional tree climbing instructor. His TED-talk is titled *What Are You Waiting For?* and his web sites are *Conscious Being Alliance* and *All Things Pass*.

S. Brian Willson commanded a United States Air Force combat security unit in Viet Nam. As a lawyer he critiques the US Injustice system and its equally criminal foreign policies. He is the author of *On Third World Legs and Blood On the Tracks*, and is featured in two documentaries, *The Healing of Brian Willson*, and *Paying the Price for Peace*. He is the recipient of numerous awards for his peace and justice activities, and in addition to his J.D., holds two honorary degrees.
